## Supporting those in greatest need at Christmas

*In a story where one of the features is an arduous journey by a heavily pregnant woman, only for her and her husband to be told there is “no room at the inn”, gifts that support those in difficult circumstances are a wonderful blessing. You could well be someone else’s “Christmas Angel” this year – your generosity enabling others to enjoy gifts.*

### **Continuing to donate to the Food Bank**

Families continue to need all the basics, all the staple foods – tinned items, toiletries, pasta, toilet rolls, sanitary products, tea, coffee, long life milk, cereals, etc., and for some people this winter will be harder than ever. You might also want to consider the **“reverse Advent calendar”** – buying an item a day, collecting it in a box, and bringing it in the Sunday before Christmas – ideas for this are on sheets at the back of the Church. The Food Bank donations can be offered any time the church is open, in the side chapel.

### **“Gifts under the tree” – during the whole of Advent**

The main Christmas tree will go up in the week before Christmas, but this year we will have a tiny tree to get us under way, and encourage gifts of toys, chocolate and toiletries throughout Advent. This will mean we can get them to families who we know are in need, including those at the women’s refuge, and they will have them before Christmas Day. Items given on Christmas Eve and Christmas Day are still very welcome, of course, and these will be given where they are most needed in the New Year.

**Please do not wrap gifts** but simply leave them unwrapped, or in gift bags.

### **Alternative Christmas Gifts**

**“Alternative Gifts” this Christmas.** St Mother Teresa of Calcutta said, “It is Christmas every time you let God love others through you.” As part of Advent, we naturally reflect on our Christmas giving. Many charities now offer inventive and wonderful ways to support their work, as a gift to others – you can buy goats or bees, support Christians in the Holy Land, help preserve sections of rainforest, and much more. ## ***Advent 2021 – Rediscovering a “lost” season***

Christmas 2020 felt, for many, like a “missed” year. Families could not gather in great numbers – and sometimes could not gather at all. Christmas Masses were mainly viewed online. Before Christmas 2020 we were in tiers; after Christmas 2020 we were in lockdown.

So Christmas 2021 is different from previous years; some people are looking for a Christmas that is “bigger than ever” while others are still very fragile about large gatherings, or travelling any distance. The big shops have released their Christmas ads even earlier than usual – John Lewis and M&S put their ads out on 3<sup>rd</sup> November!

Where does that leave Advent? These four precious weeks of preparation for Christmas. Is it just a festival of hectic shopping, lasting longer than before? Is it a time of anxiety, stress or grief? This year, I would encourage you to discover and rediscover Advent by reading a small section of Chapter one and two of Luke’s Gospel, each day. You will read the story of the birth of both John the Baptist and Jesus, and reading just a few verses of each chapter, each day, will immerse you in those stories. Rest each day with a particular word or phrase, or with a particular character in the story.

In your homes, use the features of Advent, if you possibly can; create a wreath, with four candles, and light them, week by week, symbolising the journey towards Christmas. If you have a crib then bring it out slowly during Advent, starting with an empty stable, then adding the animals, and only on Christmas Eve adding Mary and Joseph, then Jesus. Pray with each new figure added to the crib.

Discover and rediscover the beautiful season of Advent – a time of waiting, in hope. It may also still be a time of difficult journeying – financial stress, and grief. If this is the case then reading Luke’s Gospel will hopefully unite you with the journey of the Holy Family – also difficult, and stressful. Please do not struggle alone; the parish is here to help. So here, too, the weeks of Advent can become precious, and hope-filled, because we do not walk the journey alone. The promise of Christmas is Emmanuel – God-is-with-us.
