# Forgiveness and Freedom

In his letter to open the Jubilee Year Pope Francis highlighted the theme of forgiveness and freedom. These are magnificent words and ideas to consider in Lent, and they are intertwined. Forgiveness liberates – whether we are the ones forgiving or being forgiven. Our Lenten journey allows us to dive deep into the life-giving, freeing, Resurrection love of Jesus Christ; such love is sometimes most radically discovered in the depths of Good Friday, the servant leadership of Holy Thursday, or the desolate 40 days in the desert.

This year, with a late Easter, the stirrings of spring will also become very evident as Lent continues. Here in the parish, on Laudate Sunday (the "joyful" Fourth Sunday of Lent) 49 young people will be Confirmed by Bishop Alan. By precious coincidence, a very significant Jubilee number! ### **Lenten Charity 2025 – Lepra**

**Today, 500 people will be diagnosed with leprosy. 28 of them are children.** We may think of leprosy as a disease from hundreds of years ago. Sadly it is still raging in some parts of the world. Leprosy is **curable**, and Lepra works to diagnose, treat and cure. This is **hope in action** and during Lent 2025 we aim to raise **£1300** which will buy **200 pairs of specialist shoes.** 

Why shoes? Those with leprosy feel no pain from their nerve endings, and one consequence is damaged feet, with ulcers. The specialist shoes help people walk and restore damaged feet. Support the Lenten Lunches, donate after any Mass, or write "Lepra" on an envelope and hand into the parish office.

One pair of shoes is £6.50. Perhaps that could be a target for each child in the parish, as well as for adults? It may be that what we give up for Lent saves us money; what better way to use such money than in charity. It feels especially significant, beautiful and poignant to help people walk again in a year focused on Pilgrims of Hope.

#### Deepening your personal faith

Lent is a significant time to give extra attention to understanding our faith. There are many, many ways to be able to do this, including spending extra time reading the Bible (this year a good focus would be Luke chapter 22 –24, covering Holy Thursday, Good Friday, the Resurrection and Ascension – every line can be prayed over).

If you are "on the go" then there are many resources online. Here are a few examples:

**Cafod** offer a daily email throughout Lent, with a prayer and reflection straight to your inbox, helping to keep a global perspective in your prayer <a href="https://cafod.org.uk/pray/lent-calendar">https://cafod.org.uk/pray/lent-calendar</a>

#### **Brentwood Cathedral Wednesdays 7pm – Lenten Talks**

Another way to deepen our personal faith is to listen to excellent speakers. This year the Lenten talks at Brentwood Cathedral take the theme of *Those who believe, don't leave* with a focus on the power of the Eucharist in our lives. The speakers are:

**Wednesday 12<sup>th</sup> March** Brenden Thompson. Brenden is originally from Barking, and is now the UK Director of the *Word on Fire Institute* working with Bishop Robert Barron.

**Wednesday 19<sup>th</sup> March Fr Philip Caldwell** is a gifted preacher who has taught in seminaries for a number of years. He is a priest of Salford Diocese.

**Wednesday 26<sup>th</sup> March Bishop Alan Williams, SM** surely needs no further introduction – our very own Bishop!

**Wednesday 2<sup>nd</sup> April Fr Stephen Morrison OPraem** is a Norbertine Priest and scholar who speaks several languages. Formerly in Chelmsford, now based in Peckham.

There is no need to register for these talks; just arrive at the Cathedral (28 Ingrave Rd, Brentwood CM15 8AT). Parking is limited, so you may find it easiest to get the train (the Cathedral is a 10 minute walk uphill from Brentwood Station) or bus 498 which is quite direct.

## Enjoy a Saturday Lenten Lunch – 12noon – 2.00pm

There's a long tradition in the parish of people gathering for lunch in Lent. A simple lunch, with a raffle! The tasty lunch – ploughman's and soup – costs £5/adult or £2 for a child under 12. All monies raised will support the parish Lenten charity, Lepra. The raffle supports a different charity each week: Samaritans; St Francis Hospice; BCYS; Alzheimers Society; Save the Children and Water Aid. It is a lovely opportunity to relax with other parishioners who you may not have met before; it is a wonderful lunch to invite friends and neighbours as a way to see the parish in action; and all of it as an excellent way to raise vital funds for charity.

#### **Practical action and giving throughout Lent**

In addition to the parish charitable giving, Lent is a good time to look wider, and perhaps find a charity to support for the rest of the year. Commit to a daily "good deed." Or discover fresh information about the work of charities you have not come across before. It is spring time – why not dive in to something that sustains the world God has given us. Our Diocesan Caritas has – as ever – done a great job of collating different ideas and resources:
